- b. Peter saw first-hand that God has power to answer prayers and help his people. He wrote in 1 Peter 3:12 that "the eyes of the Lord are on the righteous" (believers who have righteousness through Christ) "and his ears are attentive to their prayer." Why can you pray with joy and confidence?
- c. There are times that we pray all on our own. Sometimes we pray with others, as did the group of people praying for Peter. Name some groups you might pray with.
- d. Imagine that a friend comes to you for help. What might you do immediately so that you receive the help *you need* so that you can help the friend? Before you pray for the friend, what will you allow the friend to do?
- e. We don't know how or when God will answer each of our prayers. But what comfort does Romans 8:28 give us?
